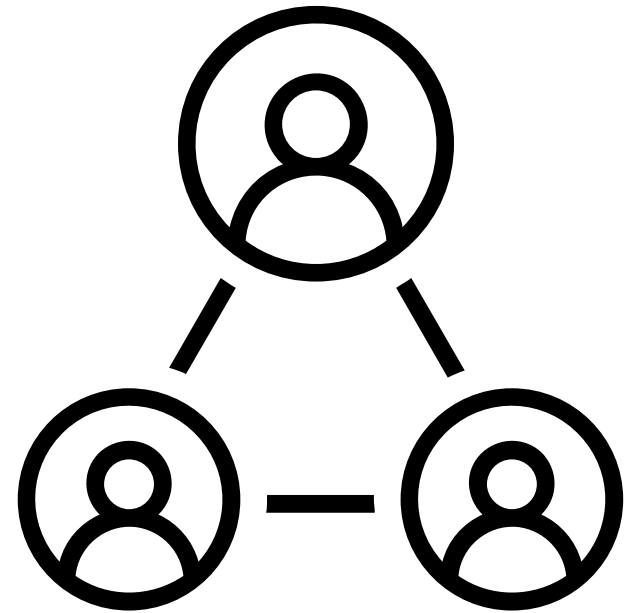

Differences in child rearing practices

- The presence of another person can mediate relational difficulties between a parent and child



Interpreting research



- Focus on the mother
- Child-led exploration can vary across cultures

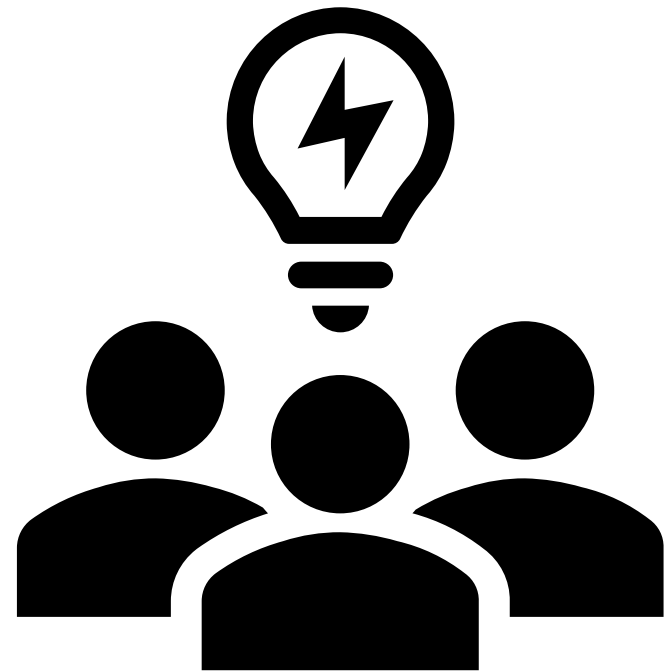
Universality across cultures

- Secure attachment is the main attachment classification
- Avoidant attachment was less evident in the global south
- Abuse and poverty are associated with lower rates of attachment security (Minde et al., 2006)
